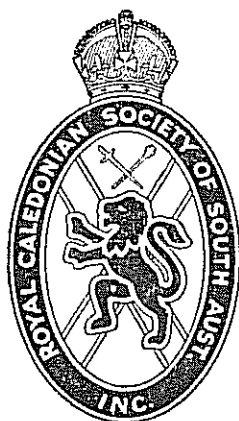

SEVENTIETH ANNUAL REPORT

1950-1951

Brither and Sister Scots,

Your Council submits this Annual Report and Financial Statement for the year ended June 30th, 1951, with a degree of satisfaction, as both show a definite forward movement.

MEMBERSHIP

New members elected for the year amounted to the record number of 93. Several of these were associate members. We would like to see many more of those arriving from the Auld Country join up.

Our ranks have been reduced by the death of the following old and esteemed members, Mr. Archie Howie, whose work and long association with the Pipe Band of this Society is known to you all; Mr. Mat Howie and Mr. Charlie Ford. On your behalf letters of sympathy were forwarded to the relatives in each case.

OUR CHIEF

Mr. Forgan, supported at all times by his wife, has had a very busy year. Both have won their way into the hearts of the members by their sincere and friendly interest in all the various activities.

We take this opportunity of thanking them both.

It is with much pleasure that I announce Mr. Forgan has accepted re-nomination for a further year. He can rely on the solid support of all members.

THE COUNCIL

The Council has met each month during the past year, and a keen interest in the affairs has been maintained.

At the Annual Meeting the three retiring directors Messrs. J. G. Duncan-Hughes, G. W. McCord and C. D. Scott were re-elected whilst Mr. D. A. Mackay was elected a director to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Mr. L. Niven.

Nominations have been received from the four retiring directors: Hon. A. L. McEwin, D. J. Macphee, L. E. Young and N. MacKinnon.

VISIT TO LORD MAYOR

On Tuesday afternoon, September 19, 1950, the Chief, Chieftains and members of the Council, paid an official call on the Lord Mayor (Mr. A. C. Rymill).

Mr. Forgan congratulated Mr. Rymill on the honour of attaining to the office of Lord Mayor, and assured him of the loyal support of the members of the Royal Caledonian Society of S.A.

ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting was held on Thursday, August 3, 1950. This was in conjunction with a Quarterly Meeting and was very well attended. During the business part of the meeting Mr. Forgan remarked on the progress of the Society throughout the year and thanked all members for their loyal support, and many who had assisted him in his office as Chief. He then moved for the adoption of the Annual Report and Balance Sheet and asked Mr. J. W. Murrell (Treasurer) to second the motion. Mr. Murrell explained certain items on the Statement of the Income and Expenditure Account and Balance Sheet. He said that although there appeared to be a loss of revenue, this was due to picnic expenses and other activities of the Society which cannot be carried on without such expense. Generally, the Society was in a much stronger position financially, and much better off than in years gone by.

As a mark of esteem to the memory of the late Past-Chief Andrew D. Young and Pipe Major McDonald, all stood in silence whilst Pipe Major Niven played a lament.

The Musical programme consisted of songs by Mr. and Mrs. J. G. K. Peart and Miss M. Howarth, dancing by the bairns and the Reel Party, selections by the Pipe Band, with a special duet of pipe music by Pipe Major and Pipe Sergeant Niven.

Mr. J. G. Duncan-Hughes proposed a comprehensive vote of thanks to Artists and Accompaniste.

A Basket Supper was served, after which the joining of hands and singing of Auld Lang Syne brought a happy evening to a fitting close.

HALLOWE'EN

After a lapse of one year, the Hallowe'en Ball was again celebrated in the Palais Royal on Friday, October 27, 1950.

It proved a very great success. The Children's programme lasted until soon after 9 o'clock, when the adults then took the floor until 12 o'clock and enjoyed a varied programme of Scottish, Old Style and Modern Dances, which had been selected by Mr. J. Ogg.

Owing to the unlimited difficulties of catering, it was impossible to arrange supper for the children, but each child was given a ticket marked Cool Drink, which on presentation at the Soda Fountain Counter enabled him or her to collect a bottle of drink.

A party to take the place of this supper was arranged for November 17 in our own Hall.

The competition for the Taylor Cups, presented to the winners of the Eightsome Reel, was won by the Argyll Set, led by Misses Janet Bishop and Jennifer Paul. In the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor, who were enjoying a holiday trip overseas, Mrs. F. R. Forgan presented these trophies. We again thank Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Taylor for their continued generosity and interest in the Bairns' Class.

The Lord Mayor and Lady Mayoress (Mr. and Mrs. A. C. Rymill) and family, who had arrived early so as to see the greater part of the children's programme were piped in through a kilted guard of Honour.

Bouquets were presented to both the Lady Mayoress (Mrs. A. C. Rymill) and the Chief's wife (Mrs. F. R. Forgan) by members of the bairns' class.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIAL

St. Andrew's Social was held on Friday, November 24, 1950. There was a very good gathering of members and friends.

Dr. T. R. Murphy, who had come from the Auld Country fairly recently gave an address on "Some Impressions of a Recent Arrival."

His mention and comparisons of the Parliaments of both countries was particularly interesting, whilst his views on the Food Parcels from both the giving and receiving ends, encouraged us to go on with the good work of sending these welcome parcels.

Among the guests were Mr. Robert Leing, Vice-President of the visiting British Bowlers, and Messrs. McLeod and Angus Granger from Scotland.

The Musical programme consisted of items by Miss Valda Harvey and Mr. Andy Robb. Highland Dancing by members of the Reel Party as well as several of the younger bairns. Other items by bairns were—a piano solo by Wendy Mcphee, humorous recitations by Margaret Detchon and a violin solo by Lennox Pawson. These items added greater interest to the programme, whilst selections by the Pipe Band were received with the usual enthusiasm.

The Hon. the Premier Thomas Playford ably responded to the toast "The State Parliament" which was given by Mr. Forgan.

The concluding toast "Kindred Societies" proposed by Past Chief M. Fotheringham was responded to by Mr. N. R. Grieve, Chief of the Lucindale Caledonian Society

The appropriate musical items by Messrs. Andy Robb and William McGarva were well received, whilst the Pipe Band, whose members had been the guests of the Society for the dinner, played the usual bright selections.

Mr. Finlay Currie, a member of the "Kangaroo" film unit in Adelaide, was present, and his amusing stories, told in an inimitable manner, gave a very merry finish to a successful evening.

BURNS NICHT CELEBRATIONS

The Annual Celebration of Burns Nicht was held on Friday, January 26, and altho' the weather was very hot and uncomfortable, there was a good rally of members and friends.

To mark this 192nd Anniversary of the Poet, an extremely brilliant address was given by Professor David Nicol Smith, an imminent educationalist from Scotland, who was staying in Adelaide for a few months.

A programme of items by Mesdames George Carter and T. V. Gameau, Mr. G. S. Gordon with Highland dancing by members of the Reel Party and selections by the Pipe Band, made up an appropriate programme.

After a comprehensive vote of thanks had been proposed by Chieftain J. Soutar, seconded by Past Chief Andrew Small, a basket supper was served. The evening concluded with the singing of the National Anthem.

HIGHLAND BALL

Held on Friday, May 11, at the Palais Royal, this was truly a night to be remembered.

The Hall was filled to its utmost capacity, with what must surely have been one of the gayest crowds to dance at the Palais.

A special item was the dancing of the Argyll Broadwords by Misses Janet Bishop, Jennifer Paul and Marjorie and Cynthia Fischer.

The programme of Modern, Old Style and Highland Dances catered for every taste.

The Pipe Band led by Pipe Major W. Niven played excellently as usual, and helped to maintain the Scottish Festival air.

The decorations, carried out by the ladies, with the help of several members of the Council, on the morning of the Ball, were of gay plaques, depicting Scottish lads and lassies, Scotch thistles, scenery, heather, etc. The Chief's Box and the stage were decorated with masses of chrysanthemums and lovely deep pink gladioli.

PIPE BAND

The following report has been received from Mr. W. D. Niven, Secretary of the Pipe Band:

The band has just completed another of its successful years. It attended 33 engagements during the year.

The band has been honoured by one of its members being selected to tour Great Britain and America with the Australian Highland Pipe Band; Piper Ronald Ross. The Royal Caledonian Society Pipe Band gave them a farewell when the ship left Outer Harbour. Our Worthy Past Chief, Andrew Small, presented Drum Major Darwin with a letter from the Lord Mayor of Adelaide to the Lord Mayor of London, and wished the band "Bon Voyage."

Another honour for the band was the arrival of the Black Watch Band from Scotland, which is to tour Australia and New Zealand. We met the Black Watch Band at the Adelaide Railway Station, and marched up to the War Memorial where a wreath was laid on the Memorial by Major Walker of the Black Watch. In the evening we marched down King William Street to the Theatre Royal, where the Black Watch Band gave four evening and four matinee Concerts. The grand finale was held on Wayville Oval, where three bands took part—the Army Band, the Black Watch, and our own. It was a very impressive sight—Band members and wives were given tickets to see the show—I don't think that we will see anything like it for a long time—it will give the people of Australia a good insight to what really goes on in Great Britain.

The band suffered a great loss in the death of Drum Sgt. A. Howie, who was a valued and solid member, rarely missing an engagement. Deepest sympathy of the band is extended to his wife and family.

We have gained four new members—one Drummer, J. Hopkins; two pipers King Davidson and Robert Horne (a recent arrival from Scotland) and M. Hatty as assistant Drum Major. Our band strength is twenty-four playing members.

The band paid a visit to Murray Bridge in February and a very enjoyable week end was spent, including a trip down the river on Sunday afternoon. Visitors who went with the band were Worthy Chief, Mr. F. Forgan; Past Chief, Mr. A. Small; Band President, Mr. C. Ferguson; Vice-President, Mr. R. McDougall and the Band Reel Party. Band members are looking forward to another week end at the River town.

The Highland Ball was once again a great success due to the efforts of our Worthy Chief, Mr. F. Forgan, Mr. and Mrs. Ogg and the Secretary of the Society, Mrs Tansell. The ball seems to be getting better every year.

The band also took part in the Jubilee Celebrations at the massed bands concert at the Wayville Oval, and in the Jubilee Procession, which was a huge success.

In conclusion, thanks are due to our Worthy President, Mr. C. Ferguson, Vice-Presidents, Officers and Band Members, for their assistance to me during the past twelve months.
