SECRETARY'S REPORT.

In accordance with By-Law 9 (b) of the Society's Rules and By-Laws, I present the Eightieth Annual Report, Statement of Income and Expenditure and Balance-Sheet for the year ended 30th June, 1961.

The financial position improved by £218 11/8 during the year and this must be regarded as satisfactory. However, it is advisable to note that there has been a drastic falling off in the income from our traditional sources and it is only that new sources viz.:—the Highland Games Queen Competition and the Highland Games Ball—have been introduced that the Society's finances for the year under review did not deteriorate substantially. It is therefore necessary to keep this in mind and maintain our efforts in these fields. Also to find other lucrative sources of income if possible.

PATRON.

It is with considerable pride that the Chief and members of the Council are able to inform members that His Excellency the Governor Lieutenant-General Sir Edric Bastyan, K.B.E., C.B., has honoured the Society by accepting the office of Patron.

CHIEF.

Our Worthy Chief, Sir A. Lyell McEwin, K.B.E., M.L.C., has acceded to our request to continue in office for a further term. He has given a tremendous stimulus to Scottish culture; sport and social functions since assuming office two years ago, not only by strengthening the bonds between Scottish Societies and Associations, but also by encouraging other bodies to associate themselves with us in the promulgation of the arts and sports of our ancestors. It is therefore indeed a pleasure that the Society will have the advantage of his energetic and efficient leadership for a further term.

The progressive policies the Chief has followed have made very heavy demands on his time, and this is all the more appreciated when it is realised he has so many demanding and important commitments in his other high offices.

The support so freely and willingly given by Lady McEwin too, is also greatly appreciated.

OBJECTIVES.

The question "What has the Society to offer its members?" frequently arises and it is wise to restate its Objects from time to time. This is done hereunder:—

- (a) To secure the affiliation of all Scottish Societies established or to be established in South Australia as may be determined.
- (b) To cultivate and foster a love for, and further the interests of History, the Art, Literature, Music and Sports of Scotland.
- (c) To promote friendly relations and good fellowship among the members and kindred Societies.
- (d) To devote a portion of its funds to charitable and benevolent objects, and especially by way of assistance to deserving Scots and people of Scottish descent.
- (e) To found institutions or otherwise provide for the care and support and education of orphan children of Scottish descent.
- (f) To secure the advancement by education of children of Scottish descent under the promotion of scholarships or otherwise, as may from time to time be determined.

- (g) To encourage Scottish immigration and devise means for the reception and settlement of Scottish immigrants in South Australia, and afford advice and assistance on arrival, also arrange to meet ships.
- (h) Generally, to further any proposal for the advancement of Scottish interests.

These were the aspirations of the Founders of the Society in 1881 and we are still striving to achieve them.

In setting out to accomplish these objectives our predecessors had first to firmly establish the Society itself, which they did, and have passed on to us the fruits of their efforts, represented mainly in:—

- The possession of unencumbered valuable freehold property, viz.—
Caledonian Hall, furniture and fittings.
- Working Capital
- A well organised Bairns Class.
- A well equipped Pipe Band.

The Society, as it stands to-day is a well founded organisation on which to build and the rest is up to us.

With the foregoing in mind, an examination of the advancement we have made during the year towards reaching our goals is made hereunder:—

Affiliation: The Chief invited all Caledonian Societies in South Australia to send delegates to a meeting on 13th September to discuss:—

- (i) re-introduction of affiliation of all Caledonian Societies in South Australia with the Royal Caledonian Society of South Australia Inc.
 - (ii) exchange of notices of meetings and functions.
- and all agreed to affiliate subject to confirmation by their individual Societies. Since then the Caledonian Societies of Clare, Port Pirie, Elizabeth, Mt. Barker, Whyalla, Mt. Gambier, Salisbury, Penola and Woomera have affiliated.

It is proposed to hold another meeting during Show Week this year in an endeavour to extend affiliation to all societies.

History, the Art, Literature, Music and Sport of Scotland.

- (i) With its established office accessible to the general public as well as members during ordinary business hours this Society is the established point in South Australia for general enquiries relative to the above, and its reference library is the means of supplying answers to a great many questions raised by the general public, the newspapers and members during each year.
- (ii) Our Pipe Band Officers are teaching piping and drumming and have many pupils in the classes they hold on our premises.
- (iii) Our Bairns Class is giving instruction in Highland and Scottish Country Dancing to the Children of members.
- (iv) Our Council is giving assistance to all who desire to form new Caledonian Societies.
- (v) Our Chief originated and is the Grand Marshal of the Adelaide Highland Games held during the past two years, and is most appreciative of the project having the advantage of the Society's well organised establishment behind it.

Promotion of Friendly Relations: Our Chief has been most energetic here. Despite the responsibilities of his high Public Office he has visited Societies in all parts of the State during the year, and has furthered his policy of maintaining a close liaison between all Scottish Bodies by personal example.

We have also been pleased to entertain our Sister Societies on the occasions of our Clansmen's Ball, Hallowe'en Ball, St. Andrew's Day Dinner, Highland Games Ball and Highland Debutante Ball.

Charities: Through the Highland Games Queen Competition we were able to do something towards our endeavours here, but lack of finance is a very limiting factor to our achievements in this direction.

Education: The Society is currently maintaining one Girls' Scholarship at Muirden's College and giving financial assistance to one boy at Scotch College. Here again, lack of finance is limiting the maintenance of two full scholarships annually, which is the minimum envisaged by our Founders.

MEMBERSHIP.

That our goals have not been reached insofar as Charities and Education are concerned is directly attributable to membership strength not increasing in the same proportion as rising costs are affecting our obligations. There is only one remedy—INCREASED MEMBERSHIP STRENGTH.

At the commencement of the year the membership strength was 535 and at the close of the year there were 519 members. The decrease is due to Rule 9 having been invoked in respect of 43 members whose subscriptions were over two years in arrears and who had failed to respond to repeated notices.

THE COUNCIL.

On 20th September, 1960, the Council appointed Mr. A. H. McKinnon as Chieftain of the Society.

The Council met on 13 occasions during the year and these were attended as follows:—Chief, Sir A. Lyell McEwin, 11; Past Chief, J. McG. Soutar, 13; Past Chief, N. H. Campbell, 1; Chieftain, F. Hislop, 13; Chieftain, A. H. McKinnon, 10; Directors L. Niven, 10; J. Ogg, 13; A. Leslie, 10; S. Hinze, 12; D. R. McCallum, 10; R. S. McLeod, 12; A. H. Milne, 10; *J. Pattullo, 10; Treasurer, R. K. Murdoch, 12.

*11 meetings since being appointed to office.

In conformity with Rule 15 of the Constitution, the Chief five Directors and the Treasurer retire from office at the Annual Meeting. The following nominations have been received:—

Director: F. Hislop, W. L. Niven, D. R. McCallum, A. Leslie, D. S. Hogarth, Q.C., F. C. Martin, C. Fraser-Wilson.

There being no other nominations for the Offices of Chief and Treasurer, the Hon. Sir A. Lyell McEwin, K.B.E., M.L.C. and Mr. R. K. Murdoch have been re-elected to their respective offices.

As the nominations for the office of Director exceed the number of vacancies, it will be necessary to conduct a ballot. This will be held at the Annual General Meeting on 25th August.

Only Life Members Hon. Life Members and Financial Ordinary Members are entitled to vote. Associate members are not eligible to vote. To facilitate voting procedure members are required to produce their membership cards at the time of voting.

BAIRNS CLASS.

The Bairns Class commenced its 1961 season on 3rd March and to 30th June 85 Bairns had been registered. There has been a sharp decrease in the strength of the Bairns Class during the past two years and this is a matter which is causing the Council some concern. Overseas visitors interested in Highland Dancing and Youth Organisations who have visited the Class have been very complimentary in their remarks relative to the efficiency in which the class is conducted. Some who have travelled the world have said they have not come in contact with a similar class which has so much to offer.

This class not only instructs our bairns in Highland Dancing but fits them to take part in social activities with utmost confidence in early youth and this is an advantage, the Council is confident, all parents will grasp once they realise what their bairns miss if they do not attend.

Mr. L. Niven, the Supervisor of the Class, expresses his appreciation of the assistance he is receiving from Mr. Ogg, the young men and young ladies who are acting as instructors and instructresses, the honorary pianist and the honorary piper.

The Bairns Picnic was held at the Kensington Gardens Reserve on 26th November. It was well attended and the enthusiasm with which all entered into the spirit of the occasion was proof that the work of members of the Social Committee in organising the function was very much appreciated.

The Bairns Christmas Tree and Party was held at the Caledonian Hall on 16th December and was another very successful function organised by the Social Committee.

MUIRDEN'S COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP.

Miss Elizabeth Pattullo was awarded the Muirden College Scholarship this year and the Chief and members of the Council wish her every success in her studies.

BALMORAL CLUB.

The young people of the Society, the great majority of whom have been members of the Bairns Class, have formed themselves into a Club entitled the "Balmoral Club" with a view to conducting their own functions, mainly in the form of dances, at the Caledonian Hall, on Saturday nights.

At a meeting held on 16th June, they formed their Committee and held their first dance on the 8th July.

The Council, the Social Committee and members are wholeheartedly supporting this Club, and have every confidence that the youth of the Society will establish a Club which will be a credit to themselves and of which their parents will be proud.

SOCIETY'S PIPE BAND.

The Secretary of the Society's Pipe Band, Director A. H. Milne, reports that the Pipe Band has had a successful year as will be seen from the Statement of Receipts and Payments published elsewhere in this report. He states the satisfactory financial position is substantially the result of the efforts of Miss Kaye McEgan, who represented the Band in the Highland Games Queen Competition. Kaye and her energetic committee, of which Mrs. C. R. McEgan was the convener, raised sufficient money to place her fourth in the competition. The Chief, the Band Management Committee, members of the Band and members generally, are very grateful to Kaye, Mrs. McEgan, and her helpers for a magnificent effort.

The Band has maintained its strength and has had a very busy year having been on parade on 94 occasions, one of which was in the competitions at the Adelaide Highland Games. The Drum Major was the runner-up in the Drum Major's Competition and was only displaced from first place on a count-back of marks. Officers and members of the Band are working hard to prepare for the next competitions at which they are confident they will take some of the major prizes.

The uniforms and equipment of the Band have been satisfactorily maintained during the year by repair and, where necessary, replacement.

The Clansmen's Ball was held at the Palais Royal on 19th August and proved to be an outstanding success both from a social and financial point of view.

Mr. Milne desires to thank the Chief, members of the Band Management Committee and members generally for the support they have given the Band during the year.

SOCIAL COMMITTEE.

The Social Committee has been very active during the year, having organised all functions held for the Bairns Class. The Springtime Ball on 24th September, the Tam o' Shanter Ball on 12th November, and the Highland Games Ball on 8th April, all of which were very successful. From the Highland Games Ball the Society's finances benefited by £212.

The Chief and members of the Council thank this Committee for its hard work and the enthusiasm displayed in organising our Social functions.

HIGHLAND GAMES QUEEN COMPETITION.

The Society and our Pipe Band sponsored Queens in the Highland Games Queen Competition. Misses Helen Murdoch and Heather McKinnon represented the Society—Helen as Queen and Heather as Page at the coronation—and Miss Kaye McEgan was the Queen for the Pipe Band. These young ladies and their Committees worked very hard to raise funds. From the joint effort of Helen and Heather, the Society received £272; the Highland Games £73 and the Woodville Spastic Children's Home £18. From Kaye's efforts the Band, the Highland Games and the Home for Incurables benefited.

The chief, members of the Council, members of the Band Management Committee and members generally are very grateful to these young people and their committees for their splendid effort.

HALLOWE'EN BALL.

Hallowe'en, which was traditionally celebrated at the Palais Royal on 28th October, was attended by Sir Thomas and Lady Playford who were the Guests of Honour. Other guests included representatives of other Caledonian and Kindred Societies and other prominent citizens. The number who attended was not as great as previously but was sufficient to make the evening a social success.

ST. ANDREW'S DAY DINNER.

This was celebrated at the Hotel Richmond on the 25th November and was attended by over 200, including the Rev. and Mrs. McGill Thompson, who were guests of honour. The usual toasts were honoured, guest speakers being Mrs. McGill Thompson, "Land O' Cakes"; Past Chief J. Wilkins (Whyalla Caledonian Society), "The Haggis"; and the Rev. McGill Thompson "The Lasses." The harmony was provided by Miss Cath Watson, Mr. George Manson, Mr. Sam Hamilton, Pipe Major Millard and Pipe Sergeant Spiers.

HIGHLAND DEBUTANTE BALL.

The Highland Debutante Ball held at the Palais Royal on 12th May was, as usual, a truly Scotch night. Ten young ladies who made their debut were presented to the Past Moderator of the Presbyterian Church—the Right Reverend W. M. Spiers—and Mrs. Spiers.

The ball was well attended and was an outstanding social as well as financial success.
