## ANNUAL REPORT, 1981-1982

1981-82 has been a year of modest progress, not just within the Society but also within the entire Scottish community. However, it has not been without its tensions and frustrations.

Our Centenary Year, 1981, was a success beyond expectations, brought about by the hard work of a small but growing band of workers. The vigour of that year has dissipated a little and we are now looking for new inspiration and drive.

The need to focus on financial matters was a major cause of the tensions which did emerge. To achieve our objectives we needed to remain economically viable. Through the hard work of the few we did just that. By 30th June we were just ahead of an uneasy break-even budget. In the process of achieving this frustrations developed in often letting matters cultural slip.

Every effort was made to meet the objects of the Society. This was done in a fashion which attempted to meet the interests of a broad cross section of the membership, and in a manner befitting the 1980's. We have concentrated on having enjoyable functions, keeping in the public eye, developing a strong Scottish community and improving our premises.

## ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

### COUNCIL

Your Council has met at least monthly throughout the year, with good attendance at each meeting. Each member was given one or more specific tasks in an attempt to spread what has become a heavy load. This has proven an effective method, although at times some tasks have had to be postponed in order to concentrate on more immediate concerns.

Directors Ian Harrison and George Alexander found it necessary to resign during the year due to work pressures. To them I extend my thanks for their valuable contributions. Directors Chris Cockerill and George Kelly together with Ian Fleetwood (Treasurer) will be retiring at the A.G.M. They have each been a tower of strength - we owe them much for their unbegrudging efforts during the year.

### MANAGEMENT

Your Society was managed through a series of sub-groups, coordinated by a Council member and involving general members.

1. BAIRNS have been under the general guidance of Director Moffatt, with classes organized by Mrs. Bev. Hawthorne, Mrs. Margaret Keane and Miss Leonie Garrick. Numbers have fluctuated but together with parents and visitors there have been up to 100 in the centre of a Friday night. The Chief's trophy for 1981 was won by Miss Leanne Carpenter.

2. PIPE BAND. 1981-82 has been a great year for our band, coming up to a strength approaching that of the 1950's. The band has won prizes in Grades 2 and 3 at the Australian and State Championships.

Those people who attended the June Cabaret/Country Dance would agree that the band was the best seen for over 15 years. The Harry Fairbank trophy for 1981 was won by Pipe Sergeant Greg Gordon who is also the President of the South Australian Pipe Band Association.

3. THE SOCIAL CALENDAR has been ably coordinated through Chieftain Richards, with many highlights including cultural functions as well as items of general enjoyment. Without exception they have been excellent and a credit to the organizers.

A feature of this year has been the slotting in of functions between the pre-determined functions. Family teas, picnics and dinners have proven successful. One highlight was the visit of eminent film commentator and producer Dr. George Bruce, sponsored by the Scottish Arts Council.

4. CLUBROOMS. These have gained considerable popularity during the year, being open now for a minimum of four evenings per week. An increased number of people have volunteered for assisting in the bar, but we need even more.

Clubroom bookings have increased in number. It is particularly pleasing to note that more and more Scottish groups are now calling the Clubrooms their "home". These groups are benefitting from small rental concessions although several have given generously to the Building Appeal.

Director Kelly, Treasurer Fleetwood and Past Chief Gardiner coordinated this work.

5. PROPERTY. Our valuable property requires ongoing maintenance, which is achieved on a planned and crisis basis. The old kitchen is gradually being cleared and we hope this will be available for better use. We have steadily improved the Centre's presentation, including a carpet and decorations. Director Kelly coordinated this work.

One significant event was the raising of the Royal Standard on our flag pole after an absence of many years.

## ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

6. CATERING has been carried out by a varying band of workers. Much hard work has gone into suppers for balls to improve the profit margin. This has been coordinated through Director Cockerill.
7. DECORATIONS. At many functions our hall has been brilliantly decorated. The 1981 Hallowe'en and the more recent Colonial Evening involved hundreds of man hours.  
Ian Marshall showed a distinct flair for this work.
8. COMMUNICATIONS. Although this has been the task of each member, the central coordination was carried out by Chieftain Atwell. He has carried out an extensive media liaison function as well as producing a quality Newsletter and periodic Newsheets. News releases have also been provided on various occasions but unfortunately they have often lacked sufficient appeal and therefore have not been printed.
9. FETE. After the success of the 1980 fete another was held in the West Parklands in 1981. Coordinated through Mrs. Raelene Welsh it proved quite a success realising a good profit.
10. TENNANTS. Our tenants as much as our members and their guests contribute much to keeping the premises open. We have three regular tenants and casual bookings have increased markedly during the year. It is estimated that between 40,000 and 45,000 people go through our doors each year.
11. CENTENARY, 1981. 1981 was celebrated with vigour and a style worthy of our Scottish community. People from many organizations joined us, for it was as much the Centenary of the entire Scottish community as it was for one society.

There were many high spots in a ceilidh, Colonial Evening and Hallowe'en. His Excellency the Governor postponed leaving the Grand Centenary Ball on no less than four occasions. We also produced 60 dozen bottles of a quality Centenary Year Port.

### MEMBERSHIP

Our membership continued to rise during the year, but it is still a very small percentage of the Scots and their descendants. The roll has been carefully reviewed and a number of people who have remained unfinancial will be struck off in the near future.

We have tried to appeal to the broad range of membership and believe there has been some success. During the year we noticed a rise in dual memberships particularly amongst the country members. They believed there has been considerable benefit in maintaining involvement in the parent organization. In recognition of this every effort has been made to keep in contact with country and interstate members.

We were much saddened during the year to learn of the deaths of Lady McEwin and Past Chief Sir John McLeay.

### SECRETARY

A society like ours cannot operate without a skilled and efficient Secretary. Mr. Reg Verrall has worked beyond the call of duty and we remain most grateful to him. During a three month leave of absence Past Chief Gardiner acted in his stead.

### KINDRED SOCIETIES

Your Chief, Chieftains and other members have undertaken an extensive programme of keeping in contact and assisting in the development of the South Australian Scottish community. Indeed this is required of us in the constitution.

## ANNUAL REPORT (continued)

### KINDRED SOCIETIES (continued)

Visits have been made to almost every society in this State and a few interstate. Regular correspondence has also been maintained with Federal, overseas and other Scottish bodies. Some publicity was also given to the S.A. situation in the "Scottish Field".

I am also pleased to report that the majority of societies are now striving to work together. We are however a long way from re-establishing a strong and united community front. Unlike most other ethnic groups the Scots seem to remain content to run their spasmodic and often poorly attended functions in borrowed premises.

### OTHER CONTACTS

As your Society holds a charter to generally represent the Scottish community, an extensive contact system has been maintained. This has included Government functions, the Naval and Military Club laying a wreath at the State War Memorial on Anzac Day, attending Church and School functions and those of other ethnic groups. A number of members attended two functions during the Queen's visit to Adelaide in 1981.

We also received a number of visits during the year, including Dr. George Bruce, attending the Adelaide Festival through the Scottish Arts Council.

### REPRESENTATION

The Scottish community in S.A. is a complex web of inter-relationships. Your Society either represents the Scottish community on a number of bodies or has a representative status on another Scottish body. Examples include the Joint Council of Commonwealth Societies, Scotch College, Scottish Associations of S.A. Inc., Adelaide Highland Games, S.A. Pipe Band Association, Ethnic Communities Council, etc.

We have striven throughout the year to make that representation worthwhile.

### SERVICES

The services offered by your Society are extensive and could grow even further with more volunteer assistance, ideas and above all, support. The office has been busy throughout the year. Information, library and referral services have been extensively sought.

### THE FUTURE

Although 1981-82 could be viewed as a reasonably successful year in that we remained intact we cannot for one moment become or continue complacent. Far from it!

We still have a formidable task in front of us, but one which could be made considerably lighter through better support from the State's Scottish community, and indeed some of our listed members.

With a world wide resurgence of Scottish culture it remains important for South Australians for an appropriate focus to develop here - one which will make this State a truly great place to live.

At the national level the Scottish Australian Heritage Council has been formed. This at present involves the four Eastern States, but correspondence has commenced to explore what role we may fulfil.

We must strive to secure ways of improving our image, increasing our participation and outreach base and through it add constructively to the general fabric of the South Australian way of life. Whilst the tartan is widely worn here and a multitude proudly proclaim their Scottish ancestry, relatively few people are interested enough to make their presence felt.

It is senseless bemoaning this fact. Instead, those who are committed need, like Robert the Bruce, set an energetic and informed example. May we succeed against all odds!

## TREASURER'S REPORT

Well another 30 June has come around again and as all members are aware subscriptions are now due. Would you all please carefully read the section later in the newsletter regarding subscriptions.

To date financial figures for the year ended 30 June, 1982, have not been finalized but these will be available at the Annual General Meeting and any members requiring a copy after that date can obtain one from the Secretary.

The past year has been only just reasonable as we have been closely monitoring the monthly income and expenses against a budget prepared early in the year. For most of the year we have been ahead of budget and at present we are approximately \$1000 ahead BUT this will soon be eliminated as it was budgeted that a fete in October 82 would raise \$3500 but as a fete co-ordinator could not be found the annual fete will not be held this year. It can therefore be seen that we will be \$2500 behind budget at the end of October. Most members have become very complacent about our financial situation assuming the Council will "fix" it. With a loan of \$144,300 still outstanding this is a luxury none of us can afford and all members must make every effort to help out. Paying your subs NOW will help immediately and attending functions organized by the fundraising committee will also help.

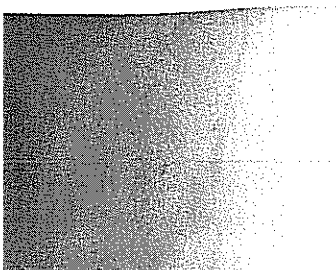

## BOOKS, BOOKS, BOOKS

A host of books have come onto the South Australian market over the last decade, many giving good coverage of Scots in S.A. One recent publication, "The Paddocks Beneath", by Elizabeth Warburton (1981, \$16.95), gives an extensive coverage of many former members of the Scottish Community.

Some ten pages are devoted entirely to our first Chief, Alexander Hay (1820-98). Mrs. Warburton describes some of the hardships which the family faced, and the efforts which led him to become one of the colony's most prominent and valued citizens.

Reference is also made to a Highland Gathering held at his home (Linden - now demolished), on St. Andrew's Day 1885. Over 1,000 people were there to watch Highland Sports and listen to a variety of items popular at the time.

The Chief commanded great respect and the "pipers band" were frequent callers.

This book is of excellent quality for the casual reader, those interested in the history of Scots in S.A. and indeed anyone with a connection in the Burnside Council area.

## BOOK REVIEWS

1. Nigel TRANTER has earned tremendous respect over recent years as an author of the popular variety. He has given a new treatment to Scottish history, putting it in a way which has made it easy to read and attractive in presentation.

Paper backs are put out by Hodder and Stoughton (Coronet Books) and generally cost about \$6. They are not generally available but Standard Books often have them displayed.

Some of his more popular works are:

### Margaret the Queen

Margaret, a young Saxon refugee princess, came to Scotland in the 11th Century. A woman of immense power, who tamed the still warlike Scots, supported Christianity and won the nation's lasting love. She married Malcolm III (Canmore), and was one of the few Queens in Britain to be canonized. Her Chapel, Mons Meg, in Edinburgh Castle is one of the oldest used buildings in Scotland. A great rendition of a true story.

### Lords of Misrule

Set in the turbulent 14th Century, he traces the intense rivalries between the major Scottish houses of the time - Stewart, Douglas and Bruce. It focusses on the dealings of young Jamie Stewart, later to become James I, with the most eminent and unscrupulous men of Scotland. There is also good account given of Alexander, the Wolf of Badenoch. This is the type of book which once picked up, is hard to put down.

#### The Wallace

One of Scotlands greatest heroes was Sir William Wallace. In the late 13th Century he led an uprising against the English usurpers. Although successful in many of his battles he finally died a martyr's death. But, all was not in vain for he had set the scene for one of Scotland's greatest victories - the Battle of Bannockburn, and the restoration of the monarchy in the person of King Robert the Bruce.

Another of Nigel Tranter's most readable books.

#### **MUIRDEN BUSINESS COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIP FOR 1983**
