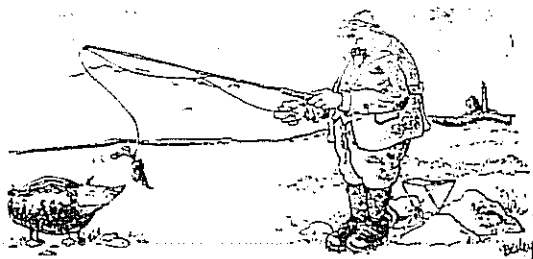

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### SCOTS BROTH - BARLEY BROTH

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1½lbs of neck of mutton	2oz Pot Barley
2 oz peas	1 onion
White of 1 Leek	1 breakfast cup diced
½ small white heart of cabbage	1 " " " turnip 1 " " " carrot
1 tblesp chopped parsley	1 grated carrot
2 quarts water	Salt and Pepper

Wash peas and soak over night (use fresh ones in season). Wipe and trim the meat, and put into the broth-pot with cold water, peas, barley and salt. Bring to boiling point and skim. Cut up the leek, onion and add with diced carrot and turnip. Simmer slowly for 3-4 hours. Add the shredded cabbage, grated carrot and simmer ½ hour longer. Just before serving add the parsley. Add pepper and more salt if required and serve very hot.

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## THE SCOTTISH-AUSTRALIA HERITAGE COUNCIL INC. SYDNEY

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Our Society is a member of The Scottish-Australia Heritage Council and receives regular Newsletters which contain very interesting items of Scottish interest, such as the following, which is quoted in part:

"A deserted 17th century settlement was recently stumbled upon by historian Iain Thomber. Time has stood still in Inniemore village, near Lochaline, Morven,

Argyll where about forty buildings still nestle together, including twenty four cottages with four kailyards, seven corn-drying kilns and a meal mill, surrounded by a protective wall.

The village was home to the bulk of the Cameron Clan who followed Miss Jenny Cameron to Glenfinnan in 1745 to join Bonnie Prince Charlie's army. Most of the villagers were evicted in the Highland clearances. The last known resident moved out in 1841 and since then the village has lain hidden in dense forest."

Among other articles in the July 1995 Newsletter is a very interesting plan of the Scottish battles 1314-1746 showing and giving brief details of a few of the more well-known battles.

The mind boggles as to what the mysterious chamber was used for. Had Robert Louis Stevenson been alive today, no doubt with his fertile mind he would have come up with some answers. However, after serious consideration and loss of sleep, I have come up with the following possibilities:

(1) Could it have been used as a sound-proof room where the bagpipers were banished to practise for concerts?

(2) Was it the bottom of a giant, secret, slippery dip, tunnelled all the way down-under from Glasgow, which could explain why there are so many Scots in South Australia?

(4) Perhaps someone pulled a handle on a trigger and all the bad performers disappeared mysteriously down a hatch to the chamber?

## Landmark's deep, dark secret . . .

Adelaide's Rotunda - one of the State's best-known landmarks - has a secret.

Apparently, it has a room - and possibly a tunnel - below its concrete floor.

And what may be inside has staff at the Adelaide City Council all abuzz.

Their sudden interest has been sparked by the discovery of old plans which show a 4.6m chamber under the structure.

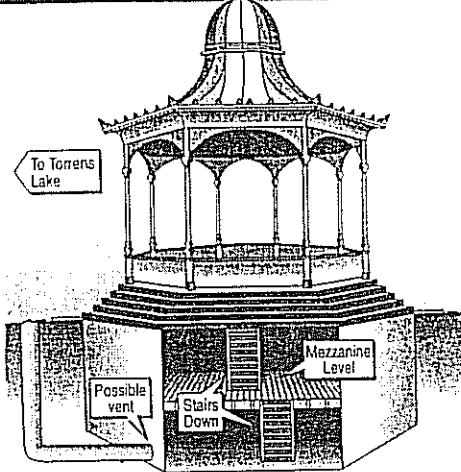
The timber floor of the rotunda, in Elder Park, was ripped up about 30 years ago and replaced with concrete but no one in officialdom can find any reference to this work or whether the chamber remained.

Mr Bob Anesbury, the council's principal technical officer, said the council did not intend digging up the concrete to solve the mystery.

But he believes someone must be digging.

"I think there have been a number of people who have been digging around the rotunda for years."

### THE DRESS OF THE HIGHLANDER

#### Crest Badges

The wearing of crest badges<sup>1</sup> as a symbol of kinship with some Highland Clan or Scottish family is a survival from an old and interesting custom recognised in heraldic law.

In former times many chiefs gave to their followers a metal plate of their crest to wear as a badge. This crest badge was affixed to the Clansman's clothing or accoutrements by a strap and buckle and when not in use the strap and buckle were coiled round the crest badge. This custom is still observed by some chiefs, and is legally competent.

The modern conventional representation of the old metal plate crest badge takes the form of a metal representation of the chief's crest encircled by a metal strap and buckle and having the chief's motto cut or engraved on the strap. This is the only form in which a clansman is permitted to display his chief's crest and its use, in the correct and approved manner, indicates that the wearer is a kinsman or follower of the chief whose crest is thus shown. Only the chief and his heir wear the crest without the strap and buckle.

A coat-of-arms, and the crest which forms part of it, is the personal property of the individual in whose name it has been recorded in the Public Registers of All Arms and Bearings in Scotland. It must not be used, in part or in whole, by any other person, and misuse of another's coat-of-arms is an offence liable to action and penalties in Lyon Court.

The Chief's coat-of-arms and banner derived from it indicate the authority, identity and/or presence of the chief just as Royal Arms do for a sovereign.

As symbols of Clan or family kinship crest badges are an ever-present reminder of an old custom and a means of showing our pride of heritage. If we value these things we must not misuse them, as their use in conformity with the Scots heraldic laws gives unity and efficiency to the clan.

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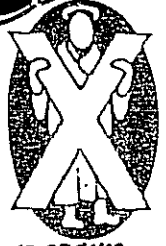
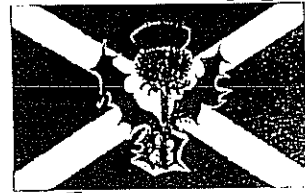
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
