BOOK REVIEW.

1745 A Military History of the Last Jacobite Rising.

Early on the afternoon of the 16th. of April 1746 the last Jacobite army was famously and bloodily defeated on Culloden Moor outside Inverness, thus bringing to an end not just eight months of rebellion but half a century of intermittent religious and political conflict.

The Battle of Culloden is arguably, the most famous episode in Scottish history and yet, at the same time it is also perhaps the least well recorded of all the British army's Campaigns.

Stuart Reid's aim in writing this book was to provide a factual and above all impartial study of the military aspects of the campaign. To draw not only on the familiar Jacobite sources, but also upon the British army's own records and the letters written at the time by its officers and soldiers.

Stuart Reid's analysis of that campaign, drawing on years of primary research and walking the actual battlefields, provides a properly balanced account of the last military engagement to be fought on British soil.

Here is an important contribution to 18th. century British military history.
