GIVE MORE

'On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold and of incense and of myrrh.'

The commercial side of Christmas troubles many. Shopping certainly can become a mad rush, but gift giving has a good, long tradition grounded in Scripture. In Matthew we read that the magi brought gifts to Jesus. When we give gifts, we imitate the magi. Moreover, we give gifts to imitate the Lord, who gave his only Son. Indeed, *Jesus gave the gift of himself.*

What does this mean? Our world is increasingly fractured, yet we often mask the distance this causes with a kind of pseudo-community—we call, we email, we text, we Facebook, we Tweet, and the list goes on. These can be important ways to keep in touch, but they can never replace the flesh-and-blood aspect of a relationship. We need to be *with* each other. To hear another voice, to see another face, to hold another's hand. *Jesus gave the gift of himself.* God had a face and a voice and he lived with real people. Jesus gave up the glory of heaven to be born into a sin-scarred world. That glorious night in Bethlehem, every day of his life, and in the ghastly pain of the cross, *Jesus gave the gift of himself.* The priceless gift of a restored relationship with God and others is now offered to those who could never afford it. There's something incredibly tangible about God's gift. What can that teach us about the way we give Christmas gifts?

In the past, Christmas became linked to Nicholas, a fourth-century bishop who lived in Lycia, where Paul was a missionary. Nicholas was born into a wealthy home, but gave his money to the poor, sometimes in creative ways. Nicholas was a generous man. He loved to give gifts because he knew that God had given him gifts, and because he knew it was God's will. And it remains God's will. Whether we give something we purchase, give food we make, or share a piece of artwork or even a song. The Lord gave himself; so should we. Indeed, when we give to each other, we give to the Lord too.

**BOOK REVIEW:
QUEEN ELIZABETH, THE QUEEN MOTHER.**

The Official Biography. BY Willam Shawcross.

In July 2003, the Queen invited William Sharcross, in his words, the 'signal honour of writing the official biography of Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother'. He was given unrestricted access to both Queen Elizabeth's papers and to members of her family, Household and staff. A handsome book, well illustrated, and running to some 1096 pages is the result, very recently published.

And as the dust jacket notes, 'Queen Elizabeth's long life spanned the whole of the 20th. Century. And this official biography tells not only her story but, through it, that of the country she loved so devotedly. Born in Glamis Castle, Scotland, this witty girl won the affections of soldiers convalescing at Glamis in the First World War. She first came to prominence after the announcement of her engagement to Prince Albert, the King's second son, and she brought a sense of ease and informality to the Royal Family, both privately and in public. Becoming Queen Consort in 1936, after the crisis of Edward VIII's abdication, she was unstinting in her support for her husband, now King George VI, and would continue to do so throughout the turbulent years ahead. Indeed she, the King and Princesses came to embody Britain's resistance against her enemies.

But her greatest challenge was to come. In 1952 George VI died of cancer, leaving Queen Elizabeth a widow at only fifty-one. And though her support of the King is often noted, his of her is often overlooked. She was devastated but, true to her nature, determined to carve out a new role for herself as Queen Mother, which she did - to splendid effect - for the next fifty years. She purchased and rebuilt Castle of Mey, her only personal property, in Wick on the north coast of her beloved Scotland. There she retreated whenever possible.

Drawing on her private correspondence and other hitherto unpublished material from the Royal Archives, William Shawcross vividly reveals the qualities that endeared her both to those who loved her personally and to the nation as a whole.
